


Fencing news

EVENTS MANAGER APPOINTED

British Fencing has appointed Katie Dolan to the position of Events Manager. Her responsibilities will include managing the delivery of competitions that come under British Fencing's remit and managing the domestic competition calendar, work previously done by the now defunct Competitions and Calendar Committee. Katie will undertake an operational review of the 2014/2015 calendar of competitions and recruit volunteers to deliver the competitions and calendar functions.

MORE PEOPLE FENCING

Figures from Sport England show a significant rise in the number of people aged 16+ fencing at least once a week compared with last quarter – up from 10,400 to 21,700. The latest results are based on interviews conducted between April 2013 and April 2014.

SABRE SOUAD

UK Sport has provided six new men's sabre places on its World Class Podium Potential programme. Those selected are: Ruben Amsalem, Soji Aiyenuro, Will Deary, James Honeybone, Curtis Miller and Jonathan Webb.

FENCING WEAPONS BANNED IN US UNIVERSITY

North Dakota State University has banned the use of fencing weapons on campus. Police and Safety Office Director Ray Boyer said the issue wasn't fencing's safety. The concern was that allowing prohibited weapons on campus could cause others to think they should be able to have prohibited items. He said it was reasonable to expect that if someone saw individuals displaying swords in a hostile manner in public, "they would call the police with an expectation that police respond with equal or greater force."

Enrique Alvarez Vazquez, the club's fencing coach, said he doesn't want NDSU to relax its weapons policy, but he wants to show that the school fencing gear is not weaponry. "I don't understand why fencing equipment is considered a weapon. Why is this equipment more dangerous than a baseball bat or a golf club?" he said.



FENCER FOR TOP IMF POST

Sunil Sabharwal, a BFA member for 17 years, has been nominated to represent the USA on the Executive Board of the International Monetary Fund (IMF). His position, which is awaiting confirmation by the US Senate, will be Alternate Executive Director, which means that he and the Executive Director will act interchangeably to cast votes on behalf of the United States. There are 24 directors who are responsible for overseeing the day-to-day work of the Fund.

Sabharwal, who has had a 25-year professional career in the financial services sector, has also had a long involvement with fencing. He was Chef de Mission to the US fencing team at the 2008 Beijing Olympics, served on the FIE executive from 2009 to 2012 (and recent recipient of the FIE gold medal) and is Secretary-General of the UNESCO-founded International Fair Play Committee, where he is credited with significantly raising the profile and the resources of the organisation.

When his family were living in London, they were all members of BF and his son Nicolas came third in the 2006 British U12 Youth Championships at sabre.

Message from the Chair

When you read this, time will have moved on, from this glorious week starting g June. But the memory will remain firm. None of us will forget the events of this week. In Strasbourg, James Davis became our first senior European champion. A champion we have known for a long time, who is steeped in our community, but who showed all the best of our sport in skills, character and focus, and won the gold medal.

Also in this June week, Sport England's latest Active People results recorded a doubling of the numbers of people aged 16+ who fence at least once a week. So, both Gold and Grow strategic boxes ticked in one week! (And of course British Fencing achieved the desired Green status for governance last November).

These are good news stories, but they don't mean that the Board and executive are working any less hard in the relentless drive to delivery on our 3G strategy. We can perhaps claim this week to have an indication that we are making some progress along the road to our ambitious 2024 vision. Your Board decided our vision should aim high, and we work to try to make sure we get as close as we can.

Which brings me to Board elections. It was disappointing to have no candidates standing for the two Board vacancies recently. We need to fill those places and we will restart the process soon, so that we have new Directors in place ready for the AGM in October. In a recent Roadshow discussion with a group of members, I was challenged on: so what do Board members do? Does it take up lots of time? Can they actually make a difference? I'm going to give some answers here and I have quotes from two other Directors. The questions bear upon the role and responsibilities of the Board, which every member should know about, anyway.

Let's start with the formal duties. Directors have a "fiduciary" responsibility; the Board collectively and individually must make sure BF is financially secure and sound. As John Troiano explained in some detail at the last AGM, there have certainly been challenges, leading to several long Board meetings. Directors have to be strategic. We don't do "operational". The Board is responsible for the direction of the sport — we have thus set a "3G" course, with aims to grow the number of fencers, to win medals and to achieve/maintain "Green" for governance. Directors oversee progress, with the executive.

Governance is a regular Board agenda item. We have to make sure BF runs things fairly, transparently, efficiently. Under Georgina Usher's executive leadership, we are determined to aspire and perform to "Honesty, Excellence and Respect" in all that we do, and at all times. We expect sharp criticism when any member feels we are falling short of those marks.

Here is Alp Orge's viewpoint: "We all become Board directors for differing reasons and with differing objectives. We bring with us different points of views, skill sets and fencing experiences; the one thing that ties us together on the Board is that we are all working to try and improve the sport for our current and perspective members to the best of our abilities, while meeting the various differing requirements of our funding partners."

In Board discussions Graham Paul sometimes manages to grab the last words, so here he is now: "I have been involved with fencing for almost 60 years, and have enjoyed competing in events of all standards. I joined the Board because I felt that I had a contribution to make and wanted to give back something to fencing. Despite the money coming into fencing, it still depends on the work of volunteers. I believe that we have made great progress since the Board was re-organised, but it still needs to be strengthened with Directors of sufficient calibre and diversity of skills. I urge people with the required skills to put themselves forward to serve on the Board."

European Championships

DAVIS IS EUROPEAN CHAMPION

James Davis, 22, has won Britain's first European championship at senior level. A solid performance in the first round meant that he was ranked seventh for the DE and received a bye to the L32 where he beat Kurfurst (CZE) 15-10 followed by Safin (RUS) 15-11. Against the Russian he was 14-9 up and scored what appeared to be the winning hit with a ducking counter, only to receive a yellow card for covering. Safin then scored twice before Davis refocused to win the fight.


In the quarter-finals he faced Choupenitch (CZE), who has beaten him twice before; with one world ranking point between them, a mouth-watering duel was on the cards. Neither fencer disappointed as the two traded hits in a display of superb footwork and lightening fast hand actions. Davis prevailed 15-13.

The 2013 European champion and four times world champion, Peter Joppich (GER), was his semi-final opponent. They were equal in the early stage of the fight before two beautifully timed counter-actions by Davis gave him a 6-4 lead going into the first break. The second period was one-way traffic as Davis went on a mesmeric run, hitting the German almost at will and winning 15-8 with a series of brilliant attacks.

The gold medal match was against world No. 6, Alexey Cheremisinov (RUS), who had beaten Erwan Le Pechoux (FRA) 15-9 in the other semi. Initially, Davis rushed his attacks, which allowed the Russian to pick him off and lead 2-0. But Davis quickly equalised and a flamboyant jumping attack took him into a 3-2 lead.

The moment of victory

Tied at 5-all at the first break, it was the Russian who came out on the attack in the second period. His much more direct approach saw him take a 10-6 lead, but the heat (370) caused Davis's white jacket to become drenched in sweat and start registering hits so that he had to change it. The break proved the defining moment of the match. When he returned to the piste, Davis quickly drew level with two counter-actions followed by two attacks. With growing confidence, he stormed to a 14-11 lead, finishing with an emphatic parry-riposte to earn the European men's foil crown.

Speaking after the event, Davis said: "I don't remember much about the last two matches, except a feeling of slow motion when Joppich attempted to duck stop hit me and I finished on his back; that was my favourite hit of the tournament. I owe a massive thank you to everyone who has made this possible. My parents who have worked so hard and supported me all the way; my coach Ziemek for his continued dedication towards me and to all the coaches that have worked with me over the years to get to this point. I am currently training in America at the Massialas Foundation and have noticed the benefits already. Lastly, a thank you to Middlesex University who have supported me during my time there and to my sponsors UK Sport and Beazley for their continued support."

World cup events

WORLD CUP BRONZES FOR MEN FOILISTS & KRUSE

Team Wins Bronze in Bonn

Great Britain's men's foil team (James Davis, Richard Kruse, Marcus Mepstead and reserve Alex Tofalides) won a bronze medal at the Bonn World Cup in March and climbed to eighth in the world ranking.



Against Japan in the L16 Kruse started by obliterating Ota 5-0 in the first fight. By the end of the third bout Davis and Mepstead had built the lead up to 14-6 and GB went into the final three bouts 27-14 up. Despite a fight back by Chida, GB eased into the quarter-finals with a 45-35 victory.

A repeat of last year's European Championship bronze medal match saw Britain face the world number two team, Russia. With the score level at 11-all after three bouts, Davis went on a 10-hit run against Khovanskiy and Kruse followed up with a solid 5-3 win over Cheremisinov. With Mepstead suffering from cramp, Tofalides came on at 30-28 and, despite receiving a red card, was able to hand the match back at 35-32 up. A 5-2 victory for Kruse over Ganeev followed by 5-3 for Davis over Cheremisinov saw GB to victory at 45-37. Meanwhile, Ukraine had an equally stunning victory over the world number one team Italy, winning 45-42.

GB faced China in the semi-finals, with Tofalides coming on for Mepstead from the start. After starting badly at 2-10 down, an inspired Tofalides beat Chen 9-4 to close the gap to 11-14. But China held on to this 3-hit advantage to lead 32-29 as Davis faced Ma in the final bout. A fight of great speed and skill followed which Davis edged 15-13, but it wasn't quite enough as China took the victory 45-44. Ukraine lost to Korea in the other semi-final to face Great Britain for the bronze medal.

With Mepstead restored to the starting line-up, GB began well and led 15-6 after the first third of the match. The effects of his quarter-final performance appeared to be telling on Davis as he lost 5-11 to Yunes in the fourth bout and was replaced by Tofalides. GB held a narrow 28-26 lead going into the final three bouts. Mepstead then put in a commanding 7-4 victory over Yunes and Tofalides beat Pogrebniak 5-2 to give GB a 40-32 cushion going into the final bout. There was nothing that Koltygo could do as Kruse took Britain to the bronze medal with a final match score of 45-36. The result has lifted the team to eighth in the world rankings.

Coach Andrey Klyushin said: "From the very beginning of the season we have worked and trained extremely hard and seriously. I'd like to highlight our team spirit as well. This victory is not a one-off. We beat some of the strongest teams in the world including Japan, Russia and Ukraine, and only lost by one hit against China on a close call at 44-44."

Bonze for Kruse in Seoul

Richard Kruse secured his best result for two years by winning bronze at the men's foil World Cup in Seoul in April. He came through the qualification rounds to draw teammate, James Davis in the L64. This was unfortunate as they were the only remaining British fencers in the tournament. Clearly not fazed by drawing his compatriot, Kruse progressed with a 15-8 victory and followed that up by beating Erwan Le Pechoux (FRA) 15-14 and Edoardo Luperi (ITA) 15-12 to make the quarter-finals. There he made light work of the world No. 4, Jianfei Ma (CHN), beating him 15-8 to guarantee a bronze medal, but went down by the same score to Race Imboden (USA) in the semis. An all-American final followed with Imboden facing Alex Massialas for the gold medal, with the latter winning 15-11.

How fencing should be developed

Ronald Velden has been involved in fencing for 21 years as a parent, founder and administrator of Camden Fencing Club and Camden International Cadet Sabre Tournament. This summer he is retiring from running the club and tournament and offers some views about the sport.

GROWTH

British Fencing like many other sports federations is under huge pressure to grow the sport. This has been a difficult proposition in recent years on account of the recession and economic climate. Membership reached a peak of 10,000+ before the recession in 2008, but since then numbers have dropped to just over 9000, including about 1200 social members. There are just over 400 registered clubs, universities and schools in the system with an average of 20 registered members.

In Germany, a country with a population of 81 million compared with Britain's 63 million, there were 25,498 fencers registered with the Deutsche Fechterbund in 2013. It is obligatory in Germany for all members of sports clubs to be registered with their federation.

The German Olympic Association publishes an annual report with statistics on 64 sports and activities. The figures published cover region, sex and age groups, as well as a table ranking sports by size. Fencing is ranked 44th and is the second smallest Summer Olympic sport. Annual growth of fencing has averaged about 2% per annum over the last 4 years.

In Britain, it is very difficult to provide an accurate figure for participation, because there is no legal requirement to be registered with a federation. Guesstimates range from 15,000 to 20,000 fencers. Based on the German model, one would expect a participation rate of around 19,500.

Nevertheless, there are differences, because the infrastructure and club programming in Germany is significantly more advanced than here. A number of large clubs have their own dedicated facilities and are part of multi-sport organizations with sponsorship deals.

I have attended a number of roadshows and meetings in the UK where there has been discussion about how to grow the sport and set targets. At one stage the target was 50,000 within 5 years. Subsequently this was reduced but was still, in my view, unrealistic. Factor in drop-out rates as well as recruitment and a realistic target over 10 years would be perhaps 3% compound annual growth.

A starting point would be to register more people who are already fencing but are not members of the BFA. This is difficult to achieve in an unregulated market, but there are two options that can be considered. The first is to make it obligatory to register fencers individually if they want to be covered by the BFA insurance policy. The second would be to provide an incentive, e.g. a commission paid to all clubs and coaches to sign up new members. Whether this would increase numbers significantly is debatable, but it might be an experiment worth exploring.

The focus of initial recruitment should be the primary age group (7-11) — statistics in many major markets show that is where you have the largest intake; children are more experimental at that age and also influenced by parents. This is the best chance the sport has got to recruit genuine talent.

Beyond that age group, recruitment becomes more difficult, particularly at secondary (12-17) and university (18-21) level. Adolescents are more likely to drop out of sport because of study commitments, peer group pressure and social life. The aim here should be on better retention rates. One solution is to sell fencing as a 'prestige sport' and a 'gateway to a good education', as it is in both USA and China.

My view is that the BFA should be concentrating on improving participation in the independent school and university sectors. There is scope for growth, particularly since many schools over the last 20 years have built indoor sports centres. Developing school leagues similar to those run by other sports and BUSA may also encourage more participation and competition.

In the world of work and family life, the sport needs to be modelled on recreation and exercise. This may appeal also to the growing number of leisure companies that manage sport and fitness centres. The major problem here is cost and profitability.

All growth is dependent on being consumer friendly and good value for money, but also on improving infrastructure and the number and quality of coaches.

DEVELOPMENT

During their formative years top fencers need access to high quality coaches and training programmes at the right level and appropriate to their age and progression.

This country is way behind most of the nations who are producing good competitive results. I believe we need to develop regional Centres of Excellence attached to major clubs and employing full-time professional coaches. These centres need to be open in the evenings and during the day for lessons, but most importantly they need to be accessible. At Camden, our junior programme recruits children who live within 20-30 minutes commuting distance from the club. The focus is on the quality of teaching and training rather than results up to the age of 14. Older fencers from elsewhere are accepted, if they are an asset to the club.

To produce a successful progamme, you need to recruit quality coaches and develop an effective training regime. This should be devised by analysing how fencers in other successful countries are being developed. Lessons can also be learnt from other sports, including rowing and cycling, while recognising that they have different dynamics and requirements.

How fencing should be developed

The millions invested by funders and sponsors over the last 7 years might have been invested better had they been used to improve development and infrastructure. The main problem is that most fencers in Britain do not have access to quality coaching or training, without which the chances of a good performance later on are severely diminished. Coaching standards are poor and that is not just about money, but the system. Too many coaches sell their ability on the basis of grades or BAF qualifications, which may be okay in measuring knowledge of theory and practice but does not indicate their talent or skills.

Anyone who watches British fencers competing abroad will see that many lack repertoire, skills honed to perfection, timing and distance and the ability to think tactically on their feet. That is down to coaching and training.

I am a supporter of the new Talent Programme (TP), providing that it is used correctly and is not a substitute for an inadequate club system. It should be used to identify talent, the progress of fencers and help clubs and coaches improve their performance.

We are 20 years behind the USA when it comes to development. In 1997 I met Buckie Leach, who was the personal coach of Iris Zimmerman, their first ever world champion. He was also the architect of their TP, which had been established shortly beforehand. My daughter Clare trained with him in 1998 and 2001, so I had a good insight into how the US programme worked at that time.

What became clear was that development in the USA, which is now bearing fruit, was down to recruitment of good quality overseas coaches, training of good domestic coaches and providing opportunities in many parts of the country to train properly. This was not about throwing a lot of money at the problem, but hard graft.

INTERNATIONAL

I don't think it is any secret that I am not a fan of the current World Class Programme (WCP). Last year I compiled some statistics about the sharp drop in performance levels in all weapons, including men's foil, since the departure of Graham Watts as performance director in December 2010. This revealed that the number of fencers who had produced at least one last 64 result in a World Cup, Grand Prix or major championship had fallen from 44 that season to just 17 in 2013. The downward spiral continues this season with only 13 fencers so far achieving that level of performance.

Moreover, the performance in world championships and Olympics in the last 2 years has also deteriorated with only two fencers managing a last 32, one of which was by virtue of beating another British fencer. Perhaps of greater significance is that in 2013 only four fencers made a last 64 or better who had not done so in 2010. These were Davis, Honeybone, Aiyenuro and Hudson. This year just one fencer makes the list for the first time, Itzkowitz, and she is training in the USA.

Looking at potential medallists, there are just three fencers who have reached that level of performance since the introduction of lottery funding: Richard Kruse, Laurence Halsted and James Davis, all of whom were coached in their formative years by Ziemek Wojciechowski.

The reality is that you cannot turn ugly ducklings into beautiful swans simply by relocating them to Lea Valley and making their training more professional. If they lack the basic skills and access to high quality coaching in their formative years, the chances of progression are zero.

If you talk to Allan Jay [Britain's most successful living fencer] and Richard Kruse [our most successful current fencer], it is clear that the basic requirements today are not significantly different from 50 years ago, apart from fitness levels and athleticism. Both fencers had similar characteristics: total focus and the willingness and ability to spend long hours training on the piste. Neither considered strength & conditioning or weights a major element of training.

Spending large sums of money on a WCP which benefits just a small number of elite athletes when the rest of the sport is starved of investment, infrastructure, good training and quality coaching will never produce a system capable of producing champions and medallists on a regular basis. Whatever results have been achieved since 1997, when Ben Montague became Britain's first world championship medallist in over 25 years, is down mainly to one coach and a high degree of good luck, in spite of the system and not because of it.

Hopefully, now that we have recruited a CEO in Georgina Usher with a good pedigree in the sport, the philosophy will change and others who run or fund our international programme will be more disposed to listen.

Fencing's forgotten Olympic Medallists

Two British fencers who won Olympic silver medals remain unknown to the fencing world. And that's because they did not win them for fencing, but for poetry. From 1912 to 1948, art competitions were considered an integral part of the Olympic movement, being replaced in 1952 by an art festival and exhibition held concurrent with the Games, a tradition that has been maintained in all subsequent summer Olympics.



Sir Theodore Cook (1867-1928) founded the Oxford University Fencing Club in 1891 and captained the English fencing team at the 1903 championships in Paris. In 1906 he was non-fencing captain of the English epee team that won a silver medal at the Intercalated Games in Athens, later writing The Cruise of the Branwen, an account of the team's leisurely progress around the Mediterranean aboard Lord Howard de Walden's yacht. He was also involved in the arrangements for the London Olympics of 1908 and a member of the International Olympic Committee.

Editor of **The Field** magazine, Cook was a distinguished art critic and writer, and in 1920 he won a silver medal in the Literature category for his poem recalling the horrors of the First World War, **Olympic Games of Antwerp.**

Olympic Games of Antwerp

Sheeted in silence, black as a lonely tarn among the hills, lay Antwerp's stadium benaeth an empty sky...

In whose honour now do you assemble?... on the night a distant murmur stole that echoed like a torrent in the hills, the thousand-footed tamp of marching men.

...one there was one who stayed and stood within the lessening arc of moonlight near us, helmeted he came but weaponless — "We are the dead!" he cried, whom you commemorate, from those warrior hills, whose streams have bled with battle we have marched, from ruined towns and blasted pasturage, from barren trenches pitted with the steel of hideous hailstorms, rusted with the rain of ceaseless blood...



Dorothy Margaret Stuart (1889-1963) was a poet, biographer and literary critic. She had been taught fencing by Captain Alfred Hutton, founder of the Amateur Fencing Association, and at the 1924 Olympic Games her cycle of five poems, **Sword Songs**, won her a silver medal for Literature. At the time of the London 2012 Olympics, they were rediscovered by Tony Perrottet of the New York Times.

Part 1, **The Gladius**, is set in Rome 103 AD, where two gladiators face off for the entertainment of Emperor Trajan:

Without a sound the darting swooping strokes Fall on unguarded flesh... Far off, there thrills one faint, high scream... With an angry gasp, He dies.

In Part 2, **The Two-Hand Sword**, we leap to circa 1495 Edinburgh, where a Scottish and a Dutch warrior duel with two-handed swords before King James IV.

Each sought to thrust the narrow point Swiftly into some crack or joint, Or else to stun and overwhelm With blows on vambrace or on helm.

Part 3, **The One-Hand Sword**, recreates the most famous duel of Renaissance France, the encounter between the courtiers Jarnac and Chataignerie in 1547. One sinks his blade into his opponent's leg.

Then, wide-eyed, ashen-lipped I saw his face tilt forward as he stood, While down his thigh ran glittering spurts of blood That made the fair sand into deadly mire.

In Part 4, **The Small Sword**, a fencing match takes place in Dunkerque in 1785 between a Captain of Hussars and the Chevalier de St Georges, who promises to touch any button on his opponent's jacket.

A space is cleared. They bow. They start. A snap of steel – a thrust in quarte; The watching ladies clap and laugh; One button touched, one cut in half!

In her epilogue, Stuart declares that the noble qualities of swordsmanship have a direct lineage from the fields of ancient Greece to the fencing courts of Paris:

Beauty, – the form of the blade, and Valour, – its force, And Honour, – its deathless soul, I have sung of them all: Now that the brief songs end, I have finished my course.



Achilles Tendon problems

Research has shown that injuries and pain linked specifically to fencing training and/or competition is evident in 93% of fencers. In general, injuries to the Achilles tendon (the tendon which connects the leg muscles to the foot) have increased substantially in recent years (not related to fencing) and males have been identified as being at greater risk of injury (2:1) than females (12:1). There may be several reasons for these differences, including the fact that males tend to participate in more sport as well as having a genetic predisposition.

Since there is a high prevalence of injuries in fencing, we decided to specifically investigate the potential for Achilles tendon (AT) problems by measuring the load of the front foot during the lunge and whether there were any gender differences. AT load was obtained from eight male and eight female club-level epee fencers using a 3D motion capture system and force platform information as they completed simulated lunges. After the data had been adjusted for the participants' body weight, the results showed that males did indeed have greater AT loading rates than females. This suggests that male fencers may be at greater risk from Achilles tendon problems as a function of both fencing training and competition.

It is important that fencers try and prevent injury to the Achilles tendon by taking precautions. To determine ways to reduce the risk of injury, we spoke to Jayne Crook (epeeist and physiotherapist) and Peter Rome (elite fencing coach) to get some expert advice on the topic. Interestingly, we all had differing opinions on the best technique to reduce the AT load, especially as the lunge can be varied in length and speed. One suggestion is that, as the front foot lands on the ground, the leg should be almost fully extended and then, following landing, the knee should move to become vertically in line with the end of the foot and no further.

Of course, wearing appropriate footwear for fencing is important — in particular shoes with good cushioning on the sole or with a heel insole such as gel/sobothane. One benefit of fencing shoes is that they have a curved heel that allows the foot to more easily roll forwards after landing and thus the knee to become in line with the end of the foot.

You should also perform a correct warm up (avoid static stretches until you are appropriately warmed up) and perform a cool down. Tendons are viscoelastic, which means that they are pliable when warm and brittle when cool, so being warmed up properly prepares the tendon to absorb the impacts that are associated with fencing. The intensity and duration of training should be gradually increased and you should ensure sufficient training before competition. Allow adequate recovery time between workouts or training.

Finally, if you know you have problems with your Achilles tendon, apply strapping and taping to the ankle to assist in creating a more secure structure; however, you must consult a physiotherapist on correct technique to prevent other problems from occurring. A physiotherapist can also advise on exercises that will help the lower limb muscles get stronger and work more efficiently to reduce the load on the Achilles tendon. All these precautions could prevent you from missing training due to injury.

Obituaries



KEN MCCUBBIN (1929-2014)

Ken McCubbin, honorary president of the Norfolk Fencing Club, died on the 5th May 2014 in his 86th year. He began fencing in 1955, having noticed some people dressed in fencing kit whilst he was studying at Goldsmith College.

On moving to Norfolk in 1964 to teach, Ken joined the Norfolk Fencing Club, where he soon established himself, becoming club captain in 1966 and undertaking a foil, coaching course under the tutorage of Leon Hill, then national coach. As part of his church's commitment to foreign aid, Ken went to Zambia in 1968 to teach. He took his fencing kit with him and found a club at Kitwe, where he was based. The only other club that was accessible, given the political ban on contact with Rhodesia, was the Kuda Sword Club in Lusaka, 220 miles away. Nevertheless, these clubs met at six-monthly intervals for competitions. As the only qualified coach in Zambia, Ken was appointed chairman of the Zambian AFA and represented the country on the Olympic and Commonwealth Games Committee.

On his return to Norfolk in 1971, he found his old club just about ticking over. However, he soon re-established himself and became club president in 1973, a role he continued to fulfil until he stepped down in 2003. The club today owes its existence in no small measure to his fortitude. He took a leading role in the creation of the Norfolk Open in 1973 and for many years organised and coordinated this event virtually single-handedly. He also established the Norfolk County Fencing Union.

Over the years Ken played a considerable part in the development of fencing in Norwich and Norfolk. He acquired qualifications in epee and sabre and taught in local schools, took part in many events to raise the profile of the sport and nurtured local coaches.

His contribution to fencing was recognised by Norwich City Council, when in 1999 and again in 2009 he received the award for outstanding services to sport. In 2011 he was presented with the BFA Award of Merit.

Ken was determined to continue to fence as long as he could, despite sustaining significant injuries unrelated to fencing. He retrained to fence left-handed, had to compensate for a loss of balance and restricted mobility. When he finally had to accept that his fencing days were over, he still attended the club to help maintain the equipment.

MICHAEL KRANZ (1959-2014)

Michael Kranz, who lost his battle with cancer on 23rd April 2014, was the enthusiastic, exuberant and decidedly German chairman of Cambridge Fencing Club, known for his generosity and joie de vivre.

Michael was born in Ludwigshafen in Germany and joined the fencing club there aged 9, cycling to training twice a week. After completing his schooling, he entered military service for 18 months before embarking on a world tour, hitchhiking across the USA, Canada, Thailand and India. He returned home to study chemistry at the University of Erlangen, Bavaria, where he continued to fence, as well as gaining a PhD in organic chemistry. A post-doc role at the University of Illinois, doing research work for Glaxo, followed and it was this work that led him to the UK: being offered a place to continue his research for Glaxo at the University of Cambridge.

He joined the Cambridgeshire Fencing Club, where he became coach and then chairman, running it for nearly ten years and pouring his considerable energy into the role. He managed much of the admin to keep the club running smoothly and organized events such as the Cambridge Open Air Tournament, fencing taster sessions and even secured yearly donations to the club from his company. He retained a sense of fun throughout, with committee meetings being turned into pizza nights at his house and club nights meticulously planned so they were, at the very least, special.

Michael also ran the club's tri-annual beginners' course. He did this with a sense of mission: to introduce as many people as he could to the sport he loved. He taught with energy, verve and humour in the German accent he determinedly never lost. It was through these courses that fencing had an even more significant impact on Michael's life, when he met his wife-to-be, Marie-Thérèse, during one of them.

Club members will always remember Michael for being exceptionally welcoming from the day they joined. He had the ability to make one feel respected as an opponent, whether you won or lost against him. At the end of every course, he would integrate the beginners into the club by holding a handicap tournament, where the winner was the fencer who had fought, not won, the most bouts. This sense of fair play was also reflected in his own fencing style when fencing beginners and intermediates, as he had an uncanny knack of losing on the deciding point in almost every fight, without any points appearing to be thrown.

Michael's dedication to the club remained undimmed, whether running the club, fencing or coaching, even after going through surgery and treatment for cancer which would have stopped many others. The Cambridge Open Air epee competition, held on 13th July, will now be fought for the Michael Kranz trophy, as a small token of the lasting legacy which he has had on fencing in and around Cambridgeshire. He will be greatly missed.

Michael is survived by his wife, Marie, and his four children.

WATERLOO PROVIDES PERFECT PLATFORM

In May Network Rail hosted a
British Fencing pop-up event at
Waterloo Station aimed at increasing
fencing participation while
providing an eye-catching spectacle
for some of London's commuters.
Over 300,000 people pass through
the busiest station in Europe on a
daily basis and it was fencing that
took centre stage.

Preparation for the event began late into the night before any fencing took place, as the piste had to be in place by 4am on the day of the event. Coaches, fencers and British Fencing staff started to arrive at 9am for a midday start. What a start it was. As the first bout began, passers-by literally stopped in their tracks watching the fencers go at each other.

Not long after the volunteer coaches from as far afield as Portsmouth began giving their first taster sessions using GO/FENCE equipment as young and old queued up for their go. With the demonstration scheduled to last until 7pm, the early signs were good and the number of people wanting to try the sport throughout the day was incredible. Demonstrations of all three weapons were put on, coaches were on hand to deliver tasters to individuals and groups alike and the audience numbers were consistently high from start to finish.

WHEELCHAIR FENCING WORLD CUP MEDALS

Two British wheelchair fencers won medals at a World Cup tournament in Lonato, Italy. Although GBR Wheelchair Fencing have lost their UK Sport funding, squad fencers Piers Gilliver, Gemma Collis and Dan Smith paid their own way to the competition.

In the men's Cat A foil, Gilliver had a bye to the L16 where he beat multi-Paralympic medallist Alberto Pellegrini (ITA) 15-10 and went on to defeat Wing Kin Chan (HKG) 15-6 in the quarter-finals. In the semis Gilliver took out London 2012 bronze medallist Matteo Betti (ITA) 15-7 to meet world No. 1 Richard Osvath (HUN) in the final, but had to settle for silver, going down 8-15.

The following day, Gilliver continued in good form with the epee, reaching the semi-finals where he lost 12-15 to No. 1 seed Norbert Calka (POL) to collect a bronze medal. Another bronze was soon secured for GB by Gemma Collis who beat Marine Ecorchon (FRA) 15-8 in the L16 and narrowly missed a place in the final, losing to Chui Yee Yu (HKG) 14-15.

In only his third international, Dan Smith defeated Jerome Prevot (FRA) 15-13 in the L16 of the men's Cat B sabre, but was unable to get past No.1 seed Panagiotis Triantafyllou (GRE) in the quarter-finals, losing 5-15 to finish 8th.

NAVY BEAT GUERNSEY ON LIBERATION ANNIVERSARY

The Royal Navy team triumphed over old rivals Guernsey for the first time in four years, with a gripping last-hit victory in a fixture fought on the 69th anniversary of the island's freedom from Nazi occupation.

Matches between RN Fencing and Sarnia Sword date back to 1971 and have been held almost every year since then.

With the score tied at four weapons apiece and the final epee bout finishing 41-41, all eyes were on the RN's Marine Lee Ormerod and Guernsey's Adam Bonnar as they squared off for an all-or-nothing decider. Two blistering attacks from Bonnar were fended off by Ormerod, before he managed to lunge home for the winning hit.

"It was an incredibly tense moment when we realised that overall victory would all come down to one hit", said team captain, Leading Naval Nurse Leanne Parry. "Marine Ormerod held his nerve despite some serious pressure and the whole team erupted when he got that final hit."

The victory is the latest in an incredible run of form for the Navy's swordsmen and women, who were named Royal Navy team of the year for 2013 and also triumphed at the Inter-Services – the annual competition held between the Army, Navy and RAF that is seen as the most important fixture in Services fencing.



Book reviews



GIGANTI REDISCOVERED

The assorted systems of rapier fighting that developed during the 16th and 17th centuries were dominated by Italian masters. One of the most influential was Nicoletto Giganti, who wrote two books, both of which are now available in English translation.

Giganti's simplified method of swordplay was presented in a book, first published in 1606, that became a popular treatise for more than a century. Aaron Miedema's translation, The School of the Sword, has been ten years in gestation and was almost finished when another translation – Venetian Rapier, Nicoletto Giganti's 1606 Rapier Fencing Curriculum – by Tom Leoni was published in 2010.

Naturally, Miedema claims his interpretation adheres more closely to Giganti's original and gives many examples of inaccuracies by Leoni. While these differences in approach may be of great interest to students of historical swordplay, the modern fencer is more likely, if interested in the history of the sword at all, to appreciate the clear explanations that accompany each of the 50 lessons analysed in Miedema's book. It also includes a useful glossary of Italian fencing terms and an introduction that looks at the differences between Giganti and his contemporary rapier masters Fabris and Capoferro.

The 'Lost' Second Book of Nicoletto Giganti (1608) was discovered by Joshua Pendragon at the Wallace Collection among the fencing books collected by Lord Howard de Walden (President of the AFA between the wars) and is the only known copy in the world. Translated by Piermarco Terminiello, it carries a foreword by the Wallace's Curator of Arms and Armour, Tobias Capwell, who points out that the book offers for the first time in four centuries the opportunity to read the continuation of Giganti's teachings.

While Giganti's first book is a well illustrated guide to formal duelling practice, concentrating on the thrust, his second work is more concerned with defending oneself in street confrontations at a time when only a priest went unarmed. It discusses multiple opponents, how to deliver cuts, the use of companion weapons, grapples, disarms, pommel strikes and dagger defences against various arms. Although the artistic quality of the plates in this second book is not nearly as good as in the first, each image has been digitally restored to make the action clearly discernible.

Nicoletto Giganti's The School of the Sword by Aaaron Taylor Miedema is published by Legacy Books Press at £12.95.


